



Why Get a COVID-19 Vaccine and Booster?

Information about COVID-19 Vaccines and Boosters for Long-Term Care Residents and Their Family Members

Get a Free Vaccine or Booster Shot

COVID-19 vaccination and booster shots are recommended for everyone who is eligible. People 18 and older are eligible for any vaccine or booster shot available in the U.S. The Pfizer vaccine is authorized for people 5 years and older, and the Pfizer booster shot is authorized for people 12 years and older.

Booster Shots Best Protect You

COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective in preventing severe disease. However, recent data suggest their effectiveness decreases over time, especially in people 65 years and older.

Studies show that a booster dose gives you the best protection against severe disease. Getting a booster shot also makes it less likely you will get COVID-19, including the Omicron variant.

What We Know About Vaccines, Booster Shots and COVID-19 Variants

- COVID-19 vaccines and booster shots are safe and effective against severe disease and death from COVID-19, including variants of COVID-19.
- COVID-19 vaccines and booster shots do not give you COVID-19 disease.
- You may have side effects after vaccination and booster shots. These are normal and should go away in a few days.
- COVID-19 infections are not common in people who are fully vaccinated and boosted, even infections from COVID-19 variants.
- Vaccinated and boosted people who get COVID-19 have less severe symptoms.
- Fully vaccinated and boosted people can spread the virus to others, but vaccinated and boosted people appear to be contagious for a shorter length of time than people who are unvaccinated.
- Even when fully vaccinated and boosted, people with weakened immune systems are at higher risk of getting COVID-19 and having more severe symptoms.

How to Get a Vaccine or Booster Shot

COVID-19 vaccines, including booster shots, are always free. You do not need health insurance to get a vaccine or booster shot. Getting a vaccine is easy. You can ask your facility, look online, check with your pharmacy, call, or text to find a location close to you.

Work with Your Facility to Schedule a Vaccination or Booster Shot

Your nursing facility or assisted living facility must help you get a vaccine or a booster shot if you want one. Talk to your facility about getting a vaccine or booster shot.
